Meet the RCS Artistic Staff

Graham Bier, RCS Music Director

Born in Western Pennsylvania, Graham was raised on a farm, but early on developed a love of music that befuddled the chickens. He attended Oberlin Conservatory of Music as an undergraduate and holds an MA from the University of York (UK) in ensemble singing. Graham has studied conducting with Daniel Moe, Joseph Cullen, Adrian Lucas, and Zhū Bù Xī. Alongside standard repertoire has conducted a variety of unusual pieces, from CATcerto with the University of York Concert Orchestra to the music for Converging Paths, a headphones-based theater piece by Slung Low held around a ruined castle. In

2012 he served as guest Chorusmaster for the BBC Philharmonic in a broadcast with the Pet Shop Boys. As a singer specializing in early music, Graham has performed across Europe, including work with Stile Antico, I Fagiolini, the Yorkshire Baroque Soloists, the Ebor Singers, and his own group Les Canards Chantants.

Graham enjoys a busy schedule as a musician, serving as Director of Music at Bryn Athyn Cathedral and lecturing in music at Bryn Athyn College, alongside his work as a singer. Recently, he has been a soloist with Big Apple Baroque and Choral Arts Philadelphia, and sings with numerous ensembles including Everlasting Voices, and The Crossing. A veritable musical glutton, he can also be spotted playing cornet for the Penn View Brass Band, and as a singer/guitarist with the bluegrass band The Hillbillies of Cohesion.

Julia Sullivan, soprano, is delighted to serve as a Vocal Coach for her first season with the Reading Choral Society. Julia is originally from Allentown, PA and currently sings and teaches throughout the Greater Philadelphia Area. Recent performances include appearances as a guest soprano soloist at Tenth Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia and St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Glenside, PA. Julia has also sung professionally as a Principal Vocalist at Camp-of-the-Woods resort, singing variety

concerts of Opera, Music Theatre, Pop, and Jazz. Awards and honors include receipt of a scholarship to study at the Songfest Apprentice Program in Malibu, CA and placement as a semi-finalist in her division in the Central Region and Chicago Chapter NATS competitions. Julia is a certified teacher and taught music and English for three years in the School District of Philadelphia and at Prestige Academy Charter School in Wilmington, DE.

Julia earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Voice Performance from the Wheaton College Conservatory of Music where she studied with Denise Gamez. She also holds a B.A. in English Literature from Wheaton College, a M.S. in Education from the University of Pennsylvania, and a M.A. in Speech, Language, and Hearing Science from Temple University. Julia currently works full-time as a Speech-Language Pathologist for Genesis Rehab Services at Berks Heim in Leesport.

Roderick Nevin, Vocal Coach

Having been a member of the bass section in the Reading Choral Society since 2004, Rod is very pleased to be working with the tenors and basses as a Vocal Coach this year. He received his Bachelor of Music degree at Mansfield University in 1996, and a Master's degree in Music Education at West Chester University in 2004.

Rod has been teaching General Music and Chorus at Mt. Penn Elementary since 1999, where he also directs the Boys' Barbershop, Girls' Ensemble, and Recorder Consort groups. He has also directed the pit orchestra for Antietam High School's musicals, as

well as being music director for the Antietam Community Theater's production of The Music Man. He currently lives in Pennside with his wife and two children.

When he's not singing with the RCS, you may find Rod as a member of the Hamilton Celtic Pipes and Drums, where he has taken up playing bagpipes, or at New Life Bible Fellowship Church in Oley, where he plays trombone in the New Life Brass, or in his garage at home, where he makes his own homebrew.

Eric Whitaker's 5 tips for improving your choral singing:

- I. "Learn as much of the music as you can so that your head isn't buried in your copy."
- 2. "Read the text, bathe in it and then sing with expression and meaning, and in phrases and lines as the text requires."
- 3. "Listen to each other: hearing what is going on around you, next to you, near you is just as important as whatever the conductor is doing in front of you."
- 4. "Make the most of delicious words and consonants, querying the diction with your director for these and vowel sounds."
- 5. "Enjoy, and let the audience hear and see you enjoy singing; it's one of the most visceral things we can share. I don't know if it is a spiritual, physiological or psychological phenomenon, but I believe now more than ever that singing is a universal, built-in mechanism designed to cultivate empathy and compassion."
